Also this one was noted later acting up by showing up plus and minus 100 kHz (Mark Coady, Selwyn, Ontario, Kenwood TS440S or Ten-Tec Argonaut II and 40 and 80 meter off centre-fed dipoles, ODXA iog via DXLD) So spurs on 11675 & 11875? Seek those (gh)`` (Glenn Hauser, OK, WORLD OF RADIO 1956, DX LISTENING DIGEST)

11775, Caribbean Beacon at 1116 with a taped sermon by the late Dr. Gene Scott — Barely audible to Poor Nov 7 — Wouldn't it be better to use 6090 until at least dawn? Their signal improved considerably as daylight moved across the continent. After all, they are broadcasting to North America and mainly to an audience in the USA. Pastor Melissa Scott may know a lot about Sacred Scriptures but she and her people obviously don't know diddly about signal propagation (Mark Coady, Selwyn, Ontario, Kenwood TS440S or Ten-Tec Argonaut II and 40 and 80 meter off centre-fed dipoles, ODXA iog via DXLD)

In this case their QSY times of 2200 and 1000 UT correspond roughly to local sunset and sunrise in their UT-4 zone (gh, DXLD)

(CMC) - The Barbados Workers Union (BWU) says the state-owned Caribbean Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) has announced plans to send home more than half of its 230-strong workforce while also agreeing to a proposal by the employees' bargaining agent for voluntary separation.

BWU special advisor and former general secretary, Sir Roy Trotman, speaking to reporters following more than two hours of discussions with CBC management on Monday night, said the union was unsuccessful in its attempt to get the Corporation to give an enhanced separation package to those volunteering to leave.

He said the meeting was a follow up to the one held last Friday where it was decided then that "it was necessary and it was according to the protocol and to the law, that what CBC should do, was to allow first of all for a discussion that would give people the chance to volunteer for separation if they so desired.

"So CBC has done that and we expect that sometime over the next two or three days, those persons who wish to leave CBC would do so," he said.

"We were hoping to get an enhanced package for those separations, but CBC has been insisting that the circumstances of its finances are so dire that they are unable to go beyond what are the limits set out in the Employment Rights Act and the Severance Payments Act," Sir Roy told reporters.

In a statement, CBC confirmed that it had agreed with the BWU on the option of voluntary separation.

"The union accepted that voluntary separation will be under the same terms and conditions as those who will be retrenched from the corporation. Those opting for voluntary separation must indicate their willingness to accept the terms and conditions no later than 4 p.m. on Friday 9 November, 2018," the CBC release said.

The corporation said that severance payments and payment in lieu of notice for those opting for voluntary separation packages, along with the retrenched employees would be as outlined in the Severance Payments Act and the Employment Rights Act.

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It said that the two sides will meet on Monday where it will be able to inform the union how many staff have volunteered to leave and have accepted the terms and conditions as well as the remaining positions to be made redundant.

Sir Roy told reporters that the BWU sought unsuccessfully to find out how much the retrenchments would cost the station, describing as "a little sad" its inability to get that costing from the corporation.

"We would think that given the enormity of the separation that would take place we ought to have had a better understanding of cost implications. We ought better to be able to understand what it is that CBC has done, what it is doing and what it will do. Our understanding is that it will be shedding 116 persons or 52 per cent of its current staff. That digs deep. It cuts very, very deep, and it's painful," Sir Roy added.

Just last week, the union had announced that workers at the stateowned entity would be receiving a five per cent wage increase and Sir Roy confirmed that talks will be held on Monday with CBC.

"This is 116 of possibly 230. So you can see just how grave that is. We will be meeting again next Monday and we have to start looking at the way by which we are going to approach these separations. There is a commitment to last-in first-out and that is consistent with what we have at the level of the Social Partnership," he added.

The six month old Mia Mottley government has embarked upon a retrenchment programme in a bid to revitalise the ailing economy. The government has entered into a US\$290 million Extended Fund Facility (EFF) with the International Monetary Fund (IMF). (via Mike Cooper, DXLD)

It was 1990 and I had come back to my parents' home in a town called Raniganj in eastern India for my winter break from university. It was a welcome change from the monotony of my studies and the never-ending hustle and bustle of Calcutta. And of course, I could now do some DXing in a bit of peace and quiet.

We had a couple of radios in the house, some from my early days in England and the US. But in my inquisitive and destructive youth, I had dismantled and destroyed almost all of them, including a Philips Henriette. So I had to settle for a Raja DL171, an IC-based set made by Philips India. In spite of the analog tuning, it was mostly an excellent receiver.

Like many other places in semi-urban India at the time, there was very little in the way of electrical interference marring radio reception. This made for some very interesting listening on medium wave, particularly on winter nights. One night I was very surprised to hear a Japanese-language station fading in and out on my radio. I did not have any external aerial connected either. Quickly I used known markers of Indian medium wave stations to make a mental note of the likely frequency of the station. When I later checked it against the World Radio TV Handbook listings, I was delighted to learn that I had actually heard Mainichi Broadcasting System (MBS) a 50 KW station on 1179 kHz from Osaka. A reception report was quickly prepared and sent out.

dxld1846 44 / 129 A couple of weeks later I was most thrilled to receive a QSL card and verification letter ! I showed them to my friends and they were delighted. Some of my friends had received Japanese and other faraway MW stations too, but only with the help of beverage antennae. Many years passed since my Japanese MW DX catch in India in 1990. This summer (2018) my wife and I decided to take a trip to Japan and our itinerary included Osaka. MBS was still on my mind after all those years.

From our hotel I tuned in to 1179 kHz on my Tivdio V115 radio, received MBS and made a recording. I then called the station and was told only the shop area was open to the public, should we wish to visit. We took the train there anyway and found the MBS building in Chayamachi, thanks to the helpful locals even though we spoke no Japanese. While we were looking around the shop, a gentleman came over and introduced himself in English. It turned out he was Mr Okamoto, ex-head of audience relations, now working in a different department of MBS. When I told him the reason why I was visiting MBS, he became very excited. His co-workers were equally surprised to hear my story. I then played my recording and he confirmed it was their station. To our utter delight, he soon came back with not one, but two QSL cards for us! We were informed that they change the design of their QSL card every couple of years. The new one has a picture of one of their transmitters on it and of course the MBS mascot Lion-chan.

It was most delightful to be able to visit an exotic radio station I had heard all those years ago and receive a warm reception from the staff too. I guess not many of us would have had a similar experience, so it is a pleasure to share my story with fellow MW DXer (Story by Joydip Hazra, Medium Wave News 64/06, November 2018 via DXLD)

Responding to pressure and interest, the IFT put up the documents and material related to the October 31 Pleno meeting with all those concession renewals. In fact, it also revealed there was another meeting between the 17th and the 31st by numbering (this is the 32nd Ordinary Meeting, the last available was the 30th Ordinary), but we don't have it yet.

There were many, many concessions renewed, too. The total is 411 stations (of 450), which break down like this.

7 Multimedios stations in Multimedios Televisión and Televisión Digital (evidently excluding XHAW)

Televisa:

126 Televimex stations (125 Las Estrellas + XHTV in another auth)

63 Radio Televisión

17 Teleimagen del Noroeste

17 Televisora de Occidente

XHBF (Televisora de Navojoa), XHTP

(Televisora Peninsular)

178 Televisión Azteca stations (excluding XHCH in Chihuahua) XHTVM

(Televisora del Valle de México)

The prices break down as follows (in pesos):

Multimedios: \$105,789,716 + \$102,101,582 = \$207,891,298 (US\$10.52 million)

Televisa: \$1,711,875,369 + \$1,628,519,340 + \$969,237,308 + \$880,336,273 = \$5,189,968,390 (national concessionaires, in order 2/5/9/regional) + \$440,368,533 (XHTV) + \$3,537,697 (XHBF) + \$32,774,988 (XHTP) = \$5,666,649,608 (US\$286.7 million)

TV Azteca: \$1,728,965,416 (Azteca Uno) + \$1,713,312,497 (Azteca 7) + \$438,533,953 = \$3,880,811,866 (US\$196.4 million)

These are all 20-year renewals but these payments must be made in a lump sum. Per year of renewal, Multimedios will pay about US\$526,000, Televisa US\$14.335 million, and TV Azteca about \$9.82 million.

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39 renewals remain to be made, mostly of Televisa local partners (current and former), a few independents like XHIJ and XHILA, and XEIMT.

Aside from a reorganization of the shares in XHZM-FM and an expected delay in the Canal 16 multiprogramming plan in Chihuahua, the IFT did not take on any other noteworthy broadcasting matters in this meeting, but this is plenty.

Update: The IFT has put out a press release, and they also mention that more renewals of radio and TV stations will be approved soon. (Raymie Humbert, Phœnix AZ, Nov 6, WTFDA Forum via DXLD)

"La Radio del Sureste Mexicano" transmits on 103.9 MHz and is owned by two municipal employees, Enrique Gutiérrez and Edi Olivé López. They canceled the program "Cangrejeando la Noticia", saying that in order to secure the advertising, the municipality, headed by Antonio Alejandro Almeida, asked them to remove the show from their air.

As municipal employees, according to the state Law of Responsibilities of Public Servants, Gutiérrez and Olivé López should be barred from making any sort of contract with the municipal government.

That's not the only recent curiosity involving advertising in Tabasco, either.

XHLI-FM/Tab. is so upset with not being paid by the state government that yesterday it began airing a notice asking outgoing Governor Arturo Núñez Jiménez to pay them, saying "Governor, the work you asked for should be paid for".

Who's Left? 39 Station Renewals Remain from the Class of 2021

With the IFT's action last week, 411 commercial television stations had their concessions renewed for 20 years. This leaves 39 commercial stations that will need renewals in the near future.

Independent Stations

Of those 39, eight stations are essentially independents. I've counted XHTRES as an independent in the pre-IFT-1 context.

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DX LISTENING DIGEST 18-46, November 12, 2018 COUNTRIES - MEXICO 20 Nov 2018 05:23:20

These stations are XHILA, XHAS, XHDTV, XHIJ, XHPNW, XHTRES, XHNSS, and XHRIO.

Canal 22

XEIMT-TDT has a commercial concession, a legacy of the fact it almost was privatized as part of the sale of Imevisión. (It was rescued from that fate by a cultural lobbying campaign.) It, too, has a 2021 concession expiration date.

Televisa Local Partners (Current and Former)

28 of the 39 are local TV stations historically associated with Televisa but not owned by the company. Some still are. including the four Telsusa stations, not so much. Some of the "local" stations actually provide network service, like XHTX and XHLL.

XHCH and XHAW

Televisión Azteca asked the IFT to exclude XHCH from the network renewals. In Chihuahua, TV Azteca has always owned three stations because Imevisión did. Leaving the concession alone may just be a formality, or it could keep the door open to a sale or other spinoff (though Azteca has not done that despite being in existence 25 years).

XHSAW was renewed, but not XHAW (yet). (Raymie, Nov 7, ibid.)

I want to circle back to something I mentioned in recapping the October 31 meeting: the approval by the IFT of an extension to get Chihuahua on the state's Canal two operating Imagen transmitters.

This is not big news, and I want to point out why. There are two factors at the state level that are causing headwinds for Canal 16 and that prompted reporting back in August that an extension would be

The state government said "the conditions do not exist for now to launch this service", and Antonio Pinedo, who heads up the state's PR apparatus, said there was no money for it to launch this year. fact, the initial launch budget has already been slashed from 80 million pesos to 50 million.

The reason the money hasn't come yet is because other matters, like health and education budgeting, became more important. Additionally, as with all social communication activities nationwide, the austerity the federal government, new legislation and a desire significantly slash this discretionary purse could serve as problems going forward

(though Chihuahua badly needs public media).

The second article actually prompted me to dig up a transparency request that included the proposed schedule for Canal 16. It's heavily reliant on programs supplied by Canal Once and Canal 22. A few local programs, including news, a tourism show, a program on indigenous people, a cooking show and some others, would also be on the schedule.

Canal 16 won't be on the air for a while — certainly not in 2018 (Raymie, Nov 9, ibid.)

Social Wolf, Social Frequencies — Part II

In late May, I published a piece on the new social station owner Frecuencias Sociales, A.C. (XHPVT, XHTOJ, XHTUJ in Jalisco). http://forums.wtfda.org/showthread.php?9113-OPMA-is-changing&p=45981#post45981

I reported that Frecuencias Sociales was associated with José Antonio Aguilar Arellano, who owns commercial radio stations in Texas including joint ownership of a few with Elías Navarro of GlobalMedia. GlobalMedia, too, had a curiosity, an announced Texas station project and a San Antonio rimshot translator (K229BJ) owned by a "GlobalMedia Network" whose director, Christian Wertz, appeared to also be from the world of Mexican broadcasting.

Well, I found the missing link. Or a couple. I went looking for more information on Christian Wertz in particular and came across some references to a company called "Wertz Bush Radiodifusores, S.A. de C.V.", which apparently conducted activities in Tepic (where Wertz once ran XETNC Radio Aztlán in Tepic). Bush had to be another name. I went back to the Frecuencias Sociales application and found him: Ing. Jaime Bush Medina.

Not only did I find him, I found the company that ties Wertz, Arellano and Bush (and K229BJ) all together: Partes y Servicios para Radiodifusión. http://www.psradio.mx/

This Zapopan, Jalisco-based company provides engineering services and equipment to radio stations in Mexico (and it's mentioned in the Frecuencias Sociales filing) and the US. And they're all part of it, together with A. Jaime Bush Ponce (apparently Jaime Bush Medina's father), Héctor García and Ing. Guillermo Corvera Caraza.

Corvera Caraza used to work for the SCT when it handled broadcasting. Today, he's involved in some other things; notably, he's the listed ombudsman for the Media Group stations.

García appears to also do engineering work. He appears as the engineer on some documents related to engineering applications filed by Texas stations owned by Protelse, which is in turn owned by Abraham Farid Karam. Protelse lists the same San Antonio address as GlobalMedia Network.

GlobalMedia is also a client of Frecuencias Sociales, according to their website, along with MVS, Capital Media, Promomedios, Multimedios, ACIR, Radiorama, Imagen, MegaRadio, Grupo Radio Korita, and XHZAM-FM Mazamitla, Jalisco.

The question now might well be...is this wolf hiding another, larger broadcaster?

In smaller news, thanks to more IFT commissioners writing their votes in advance, we have a new callsign to break.

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It's for the new FM for the Universidad Tecnológica de la Región Norte de Guerrero at Iguala. Unfortunately, they don't get their old callsign or frequency back. They'll instead be on 103.3 FM in what appears to be a new templated callsign series as XHCPAF-FM. (I believe CP means Concesión Pública.) This callsign series appears to be, like the PE, SC and SI series, sequentially assigning the last two letters based on application or some other criterion (Raymie, Nov 9, ibid.)

Speaking of SC series, one of the nation's newest community radio awards trumpeted its existence today at a press conference.

Grupo Radioasta, A.C., which will go on the air on 107.9 MHz in Ensenada, Baja California, explained that it intends to begin test transmissions sometime in the second half of 2019. They are also seeking to co-locate their equipment with a university.

They are being joined by businesses across the Yucatán Peninsula and supported by Governor Alejandro Moreno Cárdenas.

CFE rate hikes have been news in the southeast in recent months. In Quintana Roo, rates have doubled in the last year,

Speaking of Ciudad del Carmen, there will soon finally be an IFT-4 station on the air in Campeche. XHPCAR-FM 95.5

carmen/ is Grupo SIPSE's westernmost radio station and will be, as might have been predictable, Kiss FM. In an item dated October 23, Kiss FM announced its forthcoming debut and said it was 90 percent complete with construction. The station will take the Campeche version of Kiss FM in regard to format, and it will also broadcast the Panorama Informativo national news from Grupo ACIR. It's worth noting XHPCAR is not in the CPCREL system. Campeche has been an IFT-4 laggard; it has eight FMs from the auction but none of them are on yet (Raymie, Nov 12, ibid.)

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The 2019 PABF landed in this morning's Diario Oficial de la Federación. It was approved by the IFT in that missing Pleno meeting on October 22.

More Stations Coming

Notably, 7 FM and 11 TDT applications will not appear in the first round of the PABF but may appear in the second round of the PABF, likely to be published in February or March of next year. These are FCC international coordination cases.

On FM, these are Granjas el Venado Chih., San José (el Cibolo) Coah., and Bacerac (2), Hermosillo, and San Javier (2) in Sonora. The two (2) towns have social and public applications.

The 11 TDTs break down as follows: Nogales Son. (public); Castaños, Cuatro Ciénegas, Frontera, Monclova and San Buenaventura Coah. (all commercial); Monterrey (public), Cd. Apodaca and El Carmen (both social) in Nuevo León; and public and commercial applications for Reynosa, Tamaulipas.

The IFT has announced that the auction for the 39 commercial FMs would be held in the second half of 2019 (Raymie, Nov 12, ibid.)

Oslo rumours: Radio 1 closure, staff cuts.

In recent months, the low listening figures for most of the national commercial radio channels stay on. One of the two players hardest hit Bauer Media with its eight DAB channels has a 9.7% national radio market share versus the P4 seven channels total of 22.3%. Now rumours reveal extensive staff cuts in Bauer's Norwegian operations and that the Radio 1 channel with only a 0,3% market share will be shut down after just one year of operation. - Since 2017 Bauer and P4 no longer broadcast on FM.

However, speculations about the cuts and closure of Radio 1 are rejected by Bauer Media's director Lasse Kokvik in Oslo. I can reject any speculation about this, he told Media24.no, whose sources however say that employees has been informed that they will face a difficult time.

Since been closing the national FM networks in 2017, Bauer and P4 only operates DAB-only terrestrial channels together with public broadcaster NRK. Besides the main channel Radio Norway (3.2%) and P4 (14.1%), there is not any national commercial DAB channel that has more than 2.3% market share. Radio 1 has a market share of 0.3%. (Listener figures by Kantar).

For the NRK it looks better. Public service channels have a total market share of 67.8% (almost on level with its Swedish equivalent SR on FM). NRK P1 is still the major channel with 39.1% and P1+ 12.5%. However, none of the NRK's other eight channels have a share of more than 4.7%.

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In Sweden, where the main platform is FM, Bauer and P4 operates a total of ten channels on FM, while in Norway there are about 15 channels on DAB.

The expansion of FM frequency spectrum for commercial channels in Sweden has proved successful with increased listening. On the other hand, the Norwegian DAB initiative has suffered from problems in the form of irregular reception conditions and angry citizens who prefer to listen to the local radio on FM. In addition, only half the car park is equipped with DAB receivers.

Prior to the transition to DAB radio, Bauer (and SBS before) did not share the enthusiasm of competitor P4 over leaving the FM band. In other countries, Bauer's main platform is still FM, although it also broadcasts DAB, as in Denmark and Great Britain. In Finland and Sweden Bauer is on only FM.

Bauer Media in Norway belongs to the Bauer Media Group in Hamburg, Germany. The Group operates in 17 countries, and the majority shareholder is Mrs Yvonne Bauer. P4 belongs to Nordic Entertainment Group (NENT) - formerly MTG - and is part of the Swedish Kinnevik Group.

Chuck Berry's guitar riffs hit the airwaves, the phone lines open, three overhead lights shine down on the microphone and Tom Dirato's voice once again kicks off another edition of northern Oklahoma's best retro radio program.

No, this isn't the Dirato who talks about the Oklahoma State Cowboys or his beloved Coweta Tigers during the week. This Dirato is a different man on Sundays, one who hearkens back to the DJs of his youth such as Bruce "Cousin Brucie" Morrow and the "Morning Mayor" Herb Oscar Anderson. When he arrived in Oklahoma in the late 1970s, he saw his new home had the same icons in guys like Ronnie Kaye on KOMA.

Dirato has been hosting the "Stillwater Jukebox" on Triple Play Sports Radio every Sunday from 6-8 p.m. since August 2003 and only missed maybe three weeks out of almost 900 shows. Whereas sports was his bread and butter for many years and still is during the week — Sundays are reserved for his labor of love that is music.

"You don't have to talk baskets and field goals and tackles here," Dirato said. "I find that a lot of fun. Just talk music and have a good time, like old radio used to be."

Dirato approached station owner Bill Coleman and the late longtime KRMG Tulsa radio icon Jerry Vaughn nearly 20 years ago and said he would like to get into the music side just for kicks. He never thought that after the first show — back in the old studio in a former Perry beauty salon - that he would be back the next week or let alone the next 16 years.

Now at the current Stillwater location on Seventh Street in downtown, Dirato can be seen — yes, seen as he likes to open up the blinds and entertain passersby as much as his listeners - still every Sunday at the same time.

Dirato prepares for the show throughout the week to fine-tune it as much as he possibly can. As a kid growing up in Northvale, New Jersey, he and his family had an old phonograph in the house and radio was a big part of his life. Stations like WABC and WINS in New York City were mainstays with a live host on no matter what time you called.

"There was always a radio in the background and it was our connection to the world," Dirato said. "I do remember those days and wish we had those days really. It is one of those reasons I like this show because we have a little of that connection back. It is like it was. I try to make it like that without copying anybody."

For two hours a week, Dirato likes to bring that era back and plays tunes from the 1950s on to even the 1980s, though the latter is a little more rare unless it is a theme night or by request as Dirato likes to stick to his roots.

It's how it was when he started the show as he stuck mainly to the '50s and '60s with the former being something he said one doesn't hear much of anymore and what makes his show unique. While he doesn't have much big band music from the '40s or rap of the '90s - in between Dirato can pretty much find anything.

In a show the News Press was present for, the Jukebox was holding a "Rock and Roll Hall of Fame" night and there was a wide range of HOF members played from the Village People to Meatloaf and the Bee Gees down the line to Fleetwood Mac along with all those in between.

dxld1846 70 / 129 Dirato has a playsheet consisting of several pages of notebook paper stapled together chock full of blue ink with no spare real estate of white space left. In it are a variety of songs — once one is played, it is shelved for a couple of weeks unless it is requested, along with lengths and plenty of tidbits about the artist to help fill the airtime.

Filling the blank space has never been a problem for the septuagenarian, as the two hours fly by. One minute, he is coming on the air and welcoming listeners to another edition and the next, the highly popular hand-holder half hour is winding down to close out the show.

"It is such a fun two hours, it really is," Dirato said. "I have never, in any of the years I have been doing it; I have never not looked forward to coming down here. That is a lot of shows."

The show isn't like any other around as Dirato isn't just playing music for the two hours straight or taking up most of the time talking. He knows his audience and with the now five signals the station boasts, he understands his audience goes from border to border so there are a lot of drivers listening along.

He keeps it lively and personal, answering every phone call that comes in and getting every request that comes in on the radio whether it is that week or the next as long as he has the song. Usually it isn't a problem as in the hand-holder half hour, he fulfilled requests for The Teddy Bears — the only band Phil Spector ever sang in — and Lobo — real name Roland LaVoie.

Out of the nearly 400 albums placed in a system along wall racks and his personal collection that only Dirato can navigate, rarely has there been a song he couldn't find.

With the albums all from the original Perry studio, Dirato is familiar with what tracks each contains and he has a routine of loading and unloading the dual player while keeping the program on time that one is mesmerized watching him until the time has already wound down and a dozen empty disk cases lie beside the soundboard.

"People will call and say, 'That's not the Tom Dirato I know,'" he said. "That is what I aim to do. I am one doing sports, I was one working at the university and one on the Cowboy Radio Network. People who hear it for the first time say I don't even sound the same. For two hours, I am not because I am a whole other persona. I don't want this to be another sports show because it is not. If I create a little bit of a different energy and sound, I do it by design."

A music aficionado, Dirato has a wide array of listeners from college students to senior citizens — experts to people who have to hum the tune because they don't know the song or artist's name. Since it is on a sports station, word of mouth has helped it grow and most of it comes from the host's persona.

Although never a musician himself — he played the trumpet for about a year before deciding sports better suited him — Dirato gets what his listeners want. His favorite artist of all time? Little Richard, much to his parent's chagrin as his mother was a Frank Sinatra and Jerry Vale fan. Favorite albums? Can't go wrong with Neal Diamond or Johnny Rivers as well as a storyteller like Harry Chapin. Even those artists he is not a fan of, he will play with a smile on his face.

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One such singer is Elvis Presley, who Dirato felt got it a little bit easier than the rest of his military counterparts and he just never liked the songs, but when someone wants to hear "Heartbreak Hotel," you won't hear a no from the DJ.

"Live radio is what it is all about and that is what drives me on this thing knowing that I am here and people know that I am here listening to them," Dirato said. "I try to make it sound that way."

Although he doesn't have a vault full of 45s and 78s, he likes the theater of imagining he is like the radio idols of the 50's. When he gets a pat on the back from Coleman, calls from as far as Fort Smith, Arkansas, or people dancing on the sidewalk next to the studio, Dirato has all the validation he needs.

As last Sunday's show wound down with a hand-holder request from soft rock band Bread, Dirato started cleaning the discs before putting them back in the case and on the shelf. Despite another show being over, he was already looking forward to the next week and its theme of trivia night. While the past might be just that, for two hours every Sunday, he gets to live them for just a little bit longer and that's all he can ask for.

"I am so happy people remember these songs because it is so easy to forget them," Dirato said.

The "Stillwater Jukebox" can be heard every Sunday from 6-8 p.m. on Triple Play Sports Radio on signals 93.1 FM, 105.1 FM and 1020 AM in the Stillwater area along with 93.3 FM and 1580 AM in Ponca City (via DXLD) I ran across this deviation from sportstalk some months ago (gh)

How the BBC is remodeling its listening services in search of a youth audience A casual remark made recently by small child to a BBC presenter during a school visit has jangled the nerves of those in the highest echelons of Broadcasting House. "What's radio?" the child asked, after the Radio DJ tried to explain what his job entailed.

BBC Sounds

It was a reminder to the BBC that, even though the recent departures to commercial radio of star presenters Chris Evans and Eddie Mair have brought negative headlines and holes to fill in the schedules, the broadcaster faces a much more fundamental challenge.

Namely that it can't expect young people who feel undressed without a smartphone to have the same affection for radio generations who felt a physical connection to the treasured transistor

dxld1846 90 / 129 Former Labour MP James Purnell, and now head of radio for the BBC, calls BBC Sounds "probably our biggest product launch since the iPlayer".

This is the age of Spotify and Deezer and Apple Music, when music listeners expect instant access to any tune ever recorded and see no reason for loyalty to any particular radio station.

The BBC has looked at the stats and gulped. While live broadcasting accounts for 75 per cent of radio listening among older audiences, that falls to 40 per cent among 15 to 24-year-olds, who increasingly prefer streaming music mixes and podcasts. Today's primary school children might come to regard the linear radio schedule as something as antiquated as the Light Programme.

This explains why the Beeb will this month unveil what James Purnell, BBC Director of Radio, describes as "probably our biggest product launch since the iPlayer" (that was in 2007), with the advent of an all-encompassing audio platform aimed at mobile phone users: BBC Sounds.

Personalised yet unexpected

The service (already being tested in beta format) is a rich mix of music shows, documentaries and mixes, alongside podcasts, audio drama and comedy. Live listening is available from a carousel of BBC stations — but that's unlikely to be the app's principal appeal. "The proposition is going to be radio/music/podcasts — no-one else in the market will have that width. It will be encouraging people to listen without limits," Purnell tells i.

The idea is that the app takes you on a journey of personalised yet unexpected recommendations. A search for "jazz" points to a Radio 4 documentary on how the US State Department used jazz players during the Cold War for propaganda purposes. Search "hip hop" and you surface a BBC Inside Science programme looking at the neuroscience of beatboxers and rappers.

The app is a gateway to the BBC's 600 hours-a-year cache of audio drama and its roster of podcast hits, from comedy ('Evil Genius with Russell Kane') and sport ('That Peter Crouch Podcast') to true crime (law professor Philippe Sands on the trail of a Nazi fugitive in Radio 4's 'The Ratline').

Purnell says the app's recommendation algorithm is finely pitched. "It's personalised enough that it's suggesting the right stuff without being spooky [or] keeping people in their filter bubble."

Failure of iPlayer Radio

BBC Sounds is an acknowledgement that iPlayer Radio, which was introduced six years ago to allow listeners to "take BBC Radio with you wherever you go", has failed to fire the imaginations of young audiences. Purcell says it has been popular with "an audience that knows about radio" but less attractive to users who wish to search for content on-demand.

Expect iPlayer Radio to be slowly phased out next year.

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The success of BBC Sounds in finding new young listeners will be critical to the broadcaster's future attempts to make the case for the continuation of its licence fee model. Young people have become accustomed to paying £9.99 for a Spotify premium and the BBC needs to demonstrate that it provides similar value. Radio 1's YouTube video channel, which has grown to more than 5m subscribers, is another prong in the same strategy.

Seekings under-35s

"The BBC has a particular focus at the moment on under-35s," Purnell says. "Older audiences use us (the BBC as a whole) for 20-30 hours a week. Younger users... use us for eight hours a week. That's been going down and we want to increase the value that they get from their licence fee."

Purnell says that for this generation "the market norm has been set as streaming" and that the BBC is a "challenger" brand facing rivals with "deep pockets". Yet he is convinced that BBC Sounds offers something "unique" in the breadth of its offering.

It is this big picture that he is focused on, rather than the loss of Chris Evans or the next set of Rajar quarterly audience figures. "My job is...to make sure that radio is healthy in 10, 20, 50 and 100 years," he says. "The challenge for the BBC is can we modernise quickly enough so that we can serve young people just as well as we have previous generations." True. Your reception on 193.5 kHz --- Hi Glenn, I saw the item in the last DXLD regarding 389 EN in Kenosha, WI. Sorry I didn't chime in sooner, but wanted the chance to go to a quiet spot to check it out.

I was less than 30 miles from the site, and did not hear anything on 193.5. Also checked adjacent frequencies with the same result. EN's identifier spaces the 'E' and 'N' fairly close together, but not so close as to confuse it with an 'R.' It does not have any other notable keying characteristics. There are offset harmonics audible, e.g., 386.89, 387.945 (normal LSB offset), 390.02 (normal USB offset), and 391.04. At this close range, this is probably normal. I listened around 2000z 11/11/18. Hope this helps. 73, (Steve Zimmerman, Nov 12, DX LISTENING DIGEST) Tnx, I've not heard it since either (gh)

Slogan is "Black Power 93.3" with gangsta rap and hip-hop (FCC no-no words bleeped). Promo for the Marcus Garvey Cruise to the Cayman Islands and Honduras, departing Miami (that should be a blast), sponsored by the African Socialists International. Website blackpower96.org has a feature on how their antenna is (has?) gone from 45 to 70 feet. Appears to be a legitimate upgrade per the second entry on the FCC's LPFM dB showing a height (in meters) change. Operated by the African People's Education & Defense Fund.
- 96.7 MHz, FLORIDA, WMTB-LP, St. Petersburg. Singing jingle "M-T-B Music Tampa Bay" and playing apparently all local artists, mostly folk and Blues-style vocals. Legal ID top of hour and mention of studios on 1st Avenue North at The Zoo Studios (apparently a recording studio venue) as detailed on their musictampabay.com site.
- 99.1 MHz, FLORIDA WUJM-LP, St. Petersburg. Black gospel soul, later with nice-sounding Caribe accented female hosting Old School reggae (Bob Marley) alternating with Christmas soca vocals, "99 Jamz The Burg" (as in St. Petersburg) slogan. Noted airing a blatant commercial for Florida Brakes & Tires, an LPFM violation. Best of the noted LPFM signals from St. Petersburg, making it with fringe reception back to East Bay Drive, Largo.
- 100.1, WUBP-LP, St. Petersburg. No trace of this one, listed as active and licensed to the All African People's Development & Empowerment Project at a mere 10 watts. Notice the similarity in ownership name as well as inverted call letters with 96.3 WPBU-LP, highly suspicious at that. Only a strong WZJZ, Port Charlotte with Hot AC heard on the channel.
- 102.1 MHz, FLORIDA, WPBW-LP, St. Petersburg. The mere 15 watter still spewing away with pointless Catholic EWTN talk and no listeners (just one DXer).

What does it mean that most newsrooms in America don't reflect the diversity of the communities they cover? The answer can't be good. CJR visited 10 newsrooms across the country where the mismatch between the makeup of the staff and the demographics of the coverage area seems particularly notable.

What we found is both depressingly predictable—lots of talk about job pipelines and a lack of qualified candidates—and unusually candid. Editors admitted that they had, frankly, failed.

The fact that the conversations about diversity are the same ones that the industry has been having for decades (really since the report of the Kerner Commission a half-century ago), shows how little progress has been made in the United States, even as the demographics of the country have changed profoundly. It is true that journalism's failure is not unlike that of other institutions, from corporate America to college campuses to Congress, but that is as much an excuse as an observation.

For the profiles that follow, we talked to newsroom reporters, and residents about what a lack of diversity means to readers and to journalism itself. And, critically, we look at what now has to happen to fix the problem.

Walt Salmaniw, Listening Waters DXpedition, Murray Harbour North, PEI, 3—10 Nov 2018 [His SW logs are spread througt this issue]

Here are some loggings from the 2018 edition of the Listening Waters DXpedition that historically has occurred between the last week of October and the first week of November, and organized expertly by local DXer, Brent Taylor, and Nashua, NH DXer and expert (see his fantastic website, BamLog), Bruce Conti.

Although the emphasis is on MW DX, I still spent some time on the Shortwaves. We battled inclement weather, a 24 hour power outage (robbing us of, perhaps the best day for DX), and major solar disturbances. Still, there's always interesting DX to be had. I brought along only a single Asus laptop, of modest means (i5 processor, 4 GB RAM), a Perseus SDR and an Elad FDM S-2 SDR. Antennae included a 80 deg BOG of 1000' + length, a similar length 40 deg BOG, a 500' N/S mini Beverage, and a large diameter corner fed loop at about 80 deg/260 deg.

Notice my emphasis was DRM, as there's virtually nothing to be had from the west coast, anymore. I brought the Elad this year, as it really shone last year decoding signals that my Perseus DReaM software could not. High-frequency traders flirt with high-frequency spectrum News article

The ongoing hunt for low latency communications between financial exchanges has generated renewed interest in the technology used for shortwave broadcasting — but using the spectrum in this way appears to breach of US regulations.

Software developers across the world have long competed to build algorithms whose purpose is to outwit each other at making money from tiny fluctuations in asset prices. Individual algorithms can gain a major advantage over competitors if they receive information about prices at a distant financial exchange before anyone else.

This is a very murky subject. There may even be some activities of questionable legality involved

Over the last few years, financial institutions have spent enormous amounts of money building networks that can bring information from one financial exchange to another milliseconds faster than competing networks.

We previously reported on the race to build the lowest latency microwave network between London and Frankfurt.

Now an engineer in the US has stumbled upon the use of trans-Atlantic shortwave radio by high-frequency traders.

As with the use of microwave, the rationale is that radio travels twice as fast through the air than light travels through fibre-optic cables.

There are problems:

shortwave is relatively indirect, as information bounces off the stratosphere and the oceans, but these lags are compensated for by the relative sluggishness and/or unfeasibility of alternatives. Satellites orbit at much higher altitudes and a microwave tower with line of sight vision across the Atlantic would have to be 620 miles high, according to Jason England of TD Bank.

The links are also unreliable, given the constantly changing propagation conditions provided by the upper atmosphere. It is also possible that transmissions can be intercepted by a competitor — after all, this is a technology designed for broadcasting. However, according to England, this can easily be overcome by encrypting the data, even with the low (potentially 2 Kbps) data rates. There is no HFT shortwave licence

In addition to the technical limitations, the regulatory environment in the US, as it presently stands, also appears to cause problems for shortwave-based high-frequency traders: the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) does not appear to offer any sort of authorization product for this service.

The FCC's rules do allow for long distance communications in the 2-25 MHz range under Section 90.266, says communications lawyer John Joseph McVeigh. But these links are only authorized as a standby for domestic services or to "support operations which are highly important to the national interest and where other means of telecommunication are unavailable".

"I have a hard time fitting the contemplated use under either of the above criteria," McVeigh told PolicyTracker.

One provision of the FCC's rules used to authorize International Fixed Public Radiocommunication Services (IFPRS), points out Ben Dawson, a radio engineering consultant. But this was abolished in 2010 on the grounds that that Service was "outmoded" and the three licensees with IFPRS licences had ceased operation. The "experimental" workaround

The problem with experimental licences is that they are not allowed to be used for commercial operations on a regular, sustained basis. FCC limit the scope of such operations to experimental developmental ones, according to McVeigh. Virtu Networks declined to speak to PolicyTracker.

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Interestingly, the application says it will use DRM, the ITU-recognised digital radio standard for shortwave. The technology is only used by a handful of stations worldwide — and is not used by mainland US shortwave broadcasters at all — but in principle, it has a capacity of 71 Kbps.

DRM provides four channels that are designed for digitized voice and/or programming information, but according to Ruxandra Obreja, chair of the DRM Consortium, there is nothing to prevent all the channels being used for data.

The FCC's rules currently provide specific provisions for ancillary data in medium wave AM (which is used for smart grids) and VHF FM services, but no equivalent yet exists for shortwave. McVeigh said he could imagine an international broadcasting licence being granted where "the 'ancillary' data communications is the tail that wags the dog".

But according to McVeigh, HFT is unlikely to be permitted under the quite restrictive conditions attached to broadcasting licences in higher bands.

Without a rule-change or a waiver, he does not see how a station licensed only for broadcast service could legally engage only in the transmission of, for example, encrypted data available only to people or organizations that subscribe to the service and thereby obtain decryption keys.

A murky subject

PolicyTracker understands that some trading firms have been looking at international shortwave for at least the last four years. But many more, according to England, still need to understand this technology as it may require them to adjust their trading operations.

Indeed, the engineer who found the shortwave towers, Bob Van Valzah, has now been recruited to work for a trading firm.

The FCC might also need to adopt a policy that will allow high-frequency traders to use shortwave under appropriate conditions. Until then, these firms and their shell companies will likely continue to shadow box in a legal grey zone.

"This is a very murky subject", said Dawson. "There may even be some activities of questionable legality involved."•

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CELL ADVICE

I use rechargeables in all of my collection of portables. For AA cells, I use ENLOOPS now from Panasonic, formerly from Sanyo. I buy from reputable sellers since there are many knock offs of those excellent cells. The newest ones hold most of their charge for 7 years in my radio collection so all are ready to pick up and operate anytime I like. Of course if used regularly, they only have 2,000 mAhr for the ones intended for lower currant draws.

For radios using C or D cells, I have been using Rayovac brand slow self discharge cells. They are not full capacity, each are only 3,000 mAhr. but they hold on the self a year or so even with some use. They are fairly cheap, and often when I check the cells before recharging, one or two has a much lower voltage. I had been buying direct from Rayovac to get fresh cells of the same mfg dates, but Rayovac has recently stopped selling direct.

Modern Alkalines do have long shelf lives now, but I still don't trust they will never leak if forgotten in a radio.

For some one with only a few portables, buying a quality charger and batteries is fairly expensive. Luckily modern power supplies for Sangean and C Crane radios are pretty quiet. Likely a set of C or D cells could last through DX season if you only used them for DXing sessions or power outages. I like the idea of the newer Li cells some recent radios use.

For a radio collection using AA cells, it may have been cheaper to buy the Eveready Li in large packs at Walmart and use them up as long as they last in occasionally used radios. I have my kids save those when too weak for Photo use, and they operate LED lights and analog radios for many more hours.

I would like suggestions for a high quality brand of slow self discharge, full capacity C and D cells for my favorite radios, even though they are quite expensive. NiMH cells which are not self slow self discharge would seldom if ever be run down by radio listening by me. C cells have 5-6 Ahr and D cells with 10-12 Ahr are not unusual. The MAHA brand should be good. If I used a particular radio regularly, I would consider NiCD cells. They have about half the capacity. Just wait until they are weak to recharge them. I still have a set I bought from C Crane for a C Crane radio which died just out of warrantee. They do need to be recharged about twice a year if not used, and must be nearly 20 years old. A slightly older set of 4 D cells had one cell die, so those are in a 3 cell Maglite I converted to a LED bulb. I top off my rechargeables in July before Hurricane season and around Christmas before we are likely to have big snow storms.

OK, this is probably way more than any one wanted to know. I do hope some find a little useful info here (FARMERIK, Nov 7, ABDX yg via DXLD)

Your Tesla Can Go Zero to 60 in 2.5 Seconds But Can't Get AM Radio

Electric-powered motors interfere with AM reception, prompting some car makers to drop the dashboard option; 'I was so mad I told them to take the car back'

Cars and AM radio go back a long way, but there's a rough road ahead for the old travel buddies.

The same types of electric-powered motors that propel Teslas past 150 mph and the Chevy Bolt as far as 238 miles on a charge, are a total buzz kill for AM reception. Instead of sports, oldies or news, it's more like all-static, all-the-time radio.

As auto makers race headlong into an electrified future, AM radios are getting kicked to the curb, joining cassette decks, eight-track players and ashtrays.

Daniel Rich is a fan of both San Francisco's KNBR-AM 680 and his Chevy Bolt. That means his commute isn't as easygoing as it used to be. "All my other cars over the years could receive that station just fine, despite the distance," the 58-year-old eye surgeon said. "Not the Bolt."

A General Motors Co. spokeswoman said GM was aware of the issue in the Bolt and has "taken steps," but declined to say exactly what they are. The problem, experts said, is that electric-vehicle motors generate electromagnetic frequencies on the same wavelength as AM radio signals. That creates the buzzing and signal fading from electromagnetic interference.

"You get two signals that literally collide into each other and cancel each other out before the antenna even receives the signal," said Brian McKay, head of engine innovation and technology at the North American operations of Continental AG.

As EV motors grow more powerful, so does AM static. "The root of the problem is getting worse," Mr. McKay said.

Rather than field complaints about lousy reception, some auto makers, including BMW AG, have dropped AM radios from their electric vehicles. Honda Motor Co. no longer offers them on its hybrid electric Acura NSX sports car.

Tesla Inc. has phased out AM radio from all current production models, including its Model S, which used to offer it. Instead, the company offers an internet-based radio service as well as FM radio, optional HD radio and Bluetooth connectivity for streaming from smartphones.

Travis Hollman, a Dallas-area business owner, said he ordered a fully loaded Tesla when AM radios were still offered. His 2018 Model S arrived in April without one, he said: "I was so mad I told them to take the car back."

Mr. Hollman, 49, ended up keeping the car but misses tuning into local sports and conservative talk-radio stations. "They don't want me listening to Rush Limbaugh, "he joked.

Car AM radios have been as common as windshield wipers since the 1940s. On summer road trips, AM radio has been the north star for generations of drivers crossing the U.S., an idiosyncratic sampler of local Americana and a distraction from the fatigue of long hours on the open road.

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Transistor radios blasted the sports, news and music of the 1960s on AM radio stations at home and on the streets, with hand-held versions nearly as ubiquitous as the smartphone is now.

Today's AM radio stations, already struggling with a decadelong loss of advertising revenue, worry about losing any more of their drivetime audience.

"It's a real challenge for the industry, and they've been trying to convince car manufacturers to include it" in all vehicles, said Mark Fratrik, a senior vice president and chief economist at BIA Advisory Services, a market research firm focused on broadcast media.

In a sign of the times, the L.A. Kings hockey team said in September that audio for most games would switch from AM radio to internet-only radio.

The biggest AM stations hold spots on internet radio services, which give drivers a way to hear favorite stations, even far from home. Smaller AM stations might not be able to afford the equipment needed to join the digital age.

BMW said it recognized the interference problem early, in its Mini E and BMW ActiveE models. AM radio never reached the i3 model, which made its debut in 2013.

The National Association of Broadcasters criticized BMW's decision in a 2014 open letter. "AM Radio continues to serve an important role in America's cultural landscape, and i3 drivers deserve access to this programming," NAB President Gordon Smith wrote the head of BMW's North American operations.

HD Radio [IBOC], which uses digitally transmitted radio signals, is standard on U.S. models, a BMW spokesman said, and "many traditional AM stations in key markets are available on secondary and tertiary HD signals."

There isn't an easy way to eliminate the electromagnetic interference that drowns out AM signals without adding too much weight, experts said.

Toyota Motor Corp. is working on a solution, but "it's a tough problem," said Rich Sullivan, an electromagnetic compatibility expert and senior engineering manager at the auto maker's U.S. research and development center.

Mr. Sullivan pointed out that the auto industry faced a similar challenge when gas-powered cars began offering AM radio and had to deal with noise from defrosters and heater fans.

Some companies that make entertainment systems for vehicles said AM radio's time may have already passed.

"Even if we do resolve it, there's a gravitation toward internet-based radio" that is displacing traditional radio, said Balaji Iyer, vice president for connected cars at Samsung unit Harman.

One web developer offers a smartphone app that, when used with a diagnostic port adapter, can activate the dormant AM radio reception in a BMW i3 EV.

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The German auto maker warns that may void the warranty, but using the app is easy, said Art Isabell, 74, a 2014 BMW i3 owner. He retired from Apple as a software support engineer and lives in Honolulu.

Even though the AM reception in his electric vehicle is sketchy, Mr. Isabell said, he wants the option: "I rarely listen to AM radio, but I want to have it available as another potential source of information during emergency situations such as severe weather, tsunamis or North Korean missile attacks." Sir David Attenborough introduced colour television to the nation in 1967 while he was controller of BBC Two but for more than 7,000 people the technology is modish nonsense.

The latest figures issued by TV Licensing show that 51 years after the Wimbledon tennis championships became the first colour footage to be broadcast in Britain there are still 7,161 households watching on black and white sets.

They are mostly based in London, where 1,768 people had a mono licence in September, but there are also strongholds in the West Midlands (431), Greater Manchester (390) and West Yorkshire (281). Co Antrim (165) and Co Tyrone (157) were also in the top ten.

The licensing department said that it did not suspect people of lying about their televisions to get a cheaper licence. A black and white licence costs £50.50 — £100 less than a colour licence. This is a better deal than the 50 per cent discount for being registered blind.

Jason Hill, a spokesman for TV Licensing, said that he was not suspicious because black and white televisions were available commercially until the early 2000s. "There's no suggestion anyone is lying. We know black and white televisions are popular with enthusiasts. Not so long ago you could get portable black and white TVs," he said.

The number of black and white TVs has been in rapid decline since the turn of the century, but the rate of change has slowed as the last few thousand households retain their loyalty. In 2000 there were 212,000 such licences, falling to 93,000 in 2003 and 9,300 in 2015.

Mr Hill suggested that one source of decline was that older viewers, who are the most likely to have the older TV sets, are entitled to free licences when they turn 75.

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Jeff Borinsky, a television and radio technology historian, said that some people did not see an advantage to watching in colour. "There are hundreds of collectors like myself who have many black and white TVs. Who wants all this new-fangled 4k Ultra HD, satellite dishes or a screen that's bigger than your room when you can have glorious black and white TV?"

In 2014, when 11,000 mono licences were issued, one man tried to buy a black and white licence because he preferred watching TV with the colour turned off. Mr J Jones asked the BBC whether he could keep his black and white licence but was told that if his receiver accepted a colour signal then he would have to pay for it.

Since the analogue signal was switched off in 2012 people have only been able to apply for black and white licences if the digital receivers attached to their old TV did not record, as the recordings would be stored in colour (via Gerald T Pollard, NC, DXLD)

No proton events were observed at geosynchronous orbit.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit was at moderate to high levels on 05-09 Nov, normal to moderate levels on 10 Nov and normal to high levels on 11 Nov.

Geomagnetic field activity ranged from quiet to G2 (Moderate) storm levels during the period due to a pair of recurrent CH HSSs. The solar wind enviroment was enhanced on 05 Nov due to a positive polarity CH HSS. Wind speeds peaked at 610 km/s at 05/0506 UTC and the Bz component saw a maximum deflection of -8 nT at 05/0406 UTC. During this timeframe, unsettled to G2 (Moderate) geomagnetic conditions were observed. 06 Nov began a downward trend to a more nominal solar wind regime as CH HSS influence waned. Wind speeds decreased to a low of 400 km/s at 07/0611 UTC. Quiet to isolated active conditions were observed from 06-08 Nov. Mostly nominal conditions continued until early on 09 Nov with arrival of a SSBC/CIR ahead of a negative polarity CH HSS. Density reached a maximum of 18.17 particles per cubic cm at 09/1530 ahead of the CIR. Total field reached a maximum of 14 nT at 10/0600 UTC and the Bz component reached a maximum deflection of -8 nT at 10/0821 UTC. The negative polarity CH HSS arrived early on 10 Nov with wind speeds just over 600 km/s, which continued to be geoeffective through 11 Nov. Field conditions were at quiet to isolated active levels from 09-11 Nov.

Forecast of Solar and Geomagnetic Activity 12 November - 08 December 2018

Solar activity is expected to be at very low levels through the forecast period (12 Nov-08 Dec).
